WHAT TO ENTER

IN ALL GRAIN & FODDER CLASSES

- All exhibits must be part of the current season's crop (i.e. the most recent season's harvest) and selected from a sown crop.
- Exhibitors will be required to forward their exhibits for entry at their own cost.
- All samples must have tags attached stating:
 - o Exhibitor Name
 - o Phone Number
 - o Email
 - o Variety (or fodder type)
 - o and class they are to be entered in.
 - Exhibitors must nominate the class entered.
- To avoid any complications all tags to be attached using products which can be untied and then re-tied.

GRAIN

The sample will be taken and tagged:

1. Direct from the header as a commercial sample or from a bulk of at least 5 tonnes for cereals, 3 tonnes for pulses and oil seeds by the Grower or by a member of the Grains & Fodder Committee, or a Society representative.

2. Or a sample may be drawn at a grain receival site by a representative of that company, grower, or carrier.

MINIMUM SAMPLE SIZE (for judging and display)

Cereals, Pulses and Oilseeds	3kg or a 10-litre container
Small Seeds	1kg

UNDERWEIGHT ENTRIES MAY BE DISQUALIFIED.

- Samples should be supplied in a porous bag, e.g. calico bag. Not plastic bags.
- Calico grain bags and extra tags can be requested at any time to ensure samples are received correctly.

FODDER

MINIMUM SAMPLE SIZE – 10kg per entry Core samples must be commercially cored. Samples may be drawn by a hay or chaff processor representative or by the grower.

DELIVERY OF EXHIBITS

All samples must be delivered on or before Friday 13 June 2025 to either.

- the Adelaide Showground or,
- a Collection Depot

Exhibitors are reminded that the Special Regulations contained within this Schedule are merely supplementary to and subject to the General Regulations.

The members of the Society's Grains & Fodder Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Society to take any necessary action under these Special Regulations.

TRANSFERS/DISQUALIFICATION

Please ensure the exhibits are entered in the correct class at the time of entry.

If tests show that an entry has been made in the wrong class, the Society may transfer the exhibit to the correct class. All grain, other than that entered in the prepared seed classes, which in the opinion of the Judges has been treated with a seed dressing, mill dressed or from which the brush is absent, will be disqualified.

SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES

Exhibitors of all entries must state on their entry forms and tags, the name of each variety of produce.

WITHDRAWALS

All withdrawals must be made in writing and can be sent via email to <u>entries@adelaideshowground.com.au</u>. Emailed withdrawals must include "Withdrawal" in the subject line and the section (e.g. Grains & Fodder section, exhibitor name, class number/s, exhibit number (if known) and exhibit name (if applicable). Withdrawals must be made at least 24 hours prior to judging.

PRIZES & AWARDS

The following prizes will be awarded (unless otherwise specified) First, \$25; Second, \$15 In addition to the prizes listed, RA&HS sashes will be awarded to Champions in each section. The committee has the right to award a third prize if there are over five entries in a class.

PAYMENT OF PRIZE MONEY

All prize money won during the Royal Adelaide Show will be paid by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) only. Exhibitors will need to ensure they have supplied their details to receive any prize payments.

Prize money will be paid by the end of October of the current year.

Any prize money not claimed by 1 December of the current year. shall be deemed forfeited by the exhibitor and the RA&HS shall no longer be liable to pay or provide the prize.

PRIZE MONEY AND GST

Prize money as stated in the Prize Schedule does not include GST.

The prize money which we pay to successful exhibitors depends on information provided to us. If you confirm that you are GST registered and provide your Australian Business Number (ABN), we will pay the appropriate prize money plus 10% GST. We will provide you with a Recipient Created Tax Invoice which you will need to submit to the Australian Taxation Office. If you confirm you are registered for GST, in entering the competition, you acknowledge your agreement to the following:

- You will not issue a tax invoice to the RA&HS in respect to prize money received.
- You will notify the RA&HS if you cease to be registered for GST.

If you provide your Australian Business Number but are not registered for GST, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to the GST.

If you confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to GST.

IMPORTANT

It is important that you either:

- Confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, or
- Confirm you are entering as a GST registered business and supply your ABN

EXHIBITING INFORMATION

SAMPLE TESTING

All samples will be tested prior to judging.

The Society acknowledges and thanks Viterra, Limestone Coast Seeds, PIRSA, Intertek and JT Johnson & Sons for their support with sample testing of grains and fodder.

DISEASE FREE

Should any sample be found to be infected with live weevil or any contagious plant disease, it shall be disqualified and removed from the Showground. All grain samples will be fumigated prior to testing and judging to minimize any risk of accidental infestation.

CURRENT CROP

All exhibits must be part of the current season's crop, (ie the most recent season's harvest) and must be the property of and grown by the exhibitor (except in Junior and Chaff classes.) Exhibits may be entered on behalf of a grower with their consent. Any exhibit not complying with these regulations will be disqualified.

Exhibitors will not be allowed to take more than one prize with the same variety of produce in any one class. If tests show that an entry has been made in the wrong class, the Society may transfer the exhibit to the correct class. All grain, other than that entered in the prepared seed classes, which in the opinion of the Judges has been treated with a seed dressing, mill dressed or from which the brush is absent, will be disqualified.

WHEAT STANDARDS

Australian Hard – Hard; Australian Standard White – ASW; Australian Premium White – APW; Australian Soft – Soft; Durum

OWNERSHIP

All exhibits will become the property of the Society.

JUNIOR CLASSES

Any person currently enrolled in a Primary or Secondary School is eligible to enter. Permission must be obtained from the grower of the grain or fodder that is entered.

STAGING

All exhibits will be staged by the Stewards.

In all cases in which exhibits are judged to a scale of points, a card setting out the points awarded will be attached to each exhibit.

The Society reserves the right to display only prize-winning exhibits, and those considered by the Judges to be of special merit, if the entries received are more than can be staged in the accommodation available.

MOST SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITOR AWARDS

Points to be allotted as follows: First, 5 points; second, 3 points; third, 1 point.

MOST SUCCESSFUL NEW EXHIBITOR AWARD

Growers must identify as a new exhibitor when entering.

SCHOOL COMPETITIONS

Class 3 School Sow and Grow Wheat Competition

The Grains and Fodder Committee of the Royal Agricultural & Horticultural Society of South Australia (RAHS) is pleased to invite all South Australian schools to participate in the 2025 Royal Adelaide Show School Sow and Grow Wheat Competition. This competition promotes the science behind agronomy to students, teachers and parents, with the goal for students to collaborate and develop a project that grows the most vigorous wheat plants in a pot.

AIMS OF THE COMPETITION

The School Sow and Grow Wheat Competition aims to:

- Give students an insight into the science of growing wheat
- Allow students to compete in a curriculum-linked trial that provides insights in the requirements for growing a crop

- Offer students practical, hands-on insight to the future employment opportunities with crop production and agronomy
- Provide students with the opportunity to compete with other schools at the Royal Adelaide Show
- Encourage school participation and progression into grain judging competitions and crop growing

COMPETITION COMPONENTS

The 2025 Royal Adelaide Show Sow and Grow Wheat Competition will run at your school before the 2025 Royal Adelaide Show and culminate at the Show by exhibiting a pot of wheat plants.

The Competition is judged by industry experts and consists of two (2) MANDATORY components:

- Presentation of Exhibit: A pot of a minimum of four (4) growing plants. The plants are judged on uniformity and vigour, both above ground and root components
- Project component: Students must create a poster detailing information about the wheat growing and evaluation of the project. The poster is A2 size and will be on display for the duration of the Show.

HOW TO ENTER

The 2025 competition is open to interested schools.

Entries must be submitted through the Royal Adelaide Show online entry portal prior to the closing date: <u>Online</u> <u>Entries</u>

ELIGIBLE ENTRANTS

Open to students in years 5 - 10 within Australia.

Students can enter the competition individually or as a team containing a maximum of 3 students per group. Each pot represents one entry. It is recommended you only enter one pot per team.

Individuals or teams must deliver their pot of wheat and their A2 poster to the Golden Grains Pavillion at the Adelaide Showground in person at 9.30am on Monday 1st September 2025.

PROJECT OUTLINE

SEEDS

Students can source wheat seeds from local farmers or pet/feed suppliers.

Sourced wheat seeds **must not** be treated with any grain protectant.

POTS

Pots must be 14 litres in volume. This rule is extremely important, and any larger or smaller pot sizes will be disqualified. Suitable 300mm standard, 14 litre pots can be obtained from your local garden supplier or hardware store. (Old pots can be used but must be cleaned thoroughly for your project.)

Soil choice is a student decision. It may be soil from a school garden, students' home, a farm paddock or even washed sand. It is recommended to take soil from the upper 30 cm of a site and your choice of soil and reasons be documented in your report.

DO NOT USE POTTING MIX

Pots must be placed on a plastic pot saucer to avoid root growth escaping beyond the pot.

GROWING CONDITIONS

It is recommended that you sow seeds approximately 10cm apart and sow 2 or 3 seeds per planting hole to improve your chance of germination. If more than one seedling does germinate and emerges in a planting hole you can then pinch out any excess seedlings if you wish.

You must grow a minimum of 4 plants per pot

Planting (sowing) can occur anytime on or after the first day of term 2 in South Australia i.e. April 29, 2025.

Note: If your crop fails during the growing period, you can replant your pots.

To plant, you will need to supply the following:

- 14 litre pot, (black plastic 300mm)
- Local soil
- fertiliser and water
- protective mask, gloves and watering can.

Entrants can experiment with the following growing condition variables to achieve the most vigorous growth.

- wheat variety,
- seed sowing technique
- light,
- water,
- fertiliser.

NOTE: YOU MUST NOT USE ANY OF THE FOLLOWING CHEMICALS IN THIS PROJECT – HERBICIDES, INSECTICIDES, FUNGICIDES, NEMATICIDES OR PLANT HORMONES.

Remember any treatment you decide to try to get the best plant vigour should be done to the whole pot, (not to individual plants in the pot) and be clearly documented in your report. For example,

- variety all seeds in your pot must be the same variety
- Water if you choose a particular watering procedure or water type, all plants must receive the same watering.

RECORDING

Each team or entrant must keep a record of the treatments they use on the potted plants, growth of their plants and present their photos, observations, measurements and evaluation on an A2 size poster. Growth measurement can be done using criteria such as:

- Germination rate
- time from sowing to emergence of seedlings
- time from sowing to reach significant growth stages
- height of plants
- Tiller numbers
- Leaf numbers

These experimental criteria suggested are simply a guide, students are free to make other measurements.

REPORTING

Entrants should include the following in the A2 poster report (see judging rubric for further details):

- Title
- Description of the trial (how you ran the trial to achieve most vigorous growth)
- Tables of data recorded and appropriate graphs of measurements
- Photos of each major stage of plant growth and the trial
- Evaluation of plant growth and conditions
- Recommendations to improve the crop growth
- Links to the wheat industry
- Name(s) of entrant(s) and school

DELIVERY OF PROJECT

Both your pot of plants and your A2 Report must be delivered to Golden Grains Pavillion at the Adelaide Showground on Monday 1^{st} September at 9.30am. Your project will be judged between 10 - 11.30am. You are required to be with your project for the whole time of judging and for a short period after judging, when prizes and awards will be presented.

GENERAL JUDGING CRITERIA

- Condition and vigour of all plants in the trial
- Examination of one plant for vigour of roots and foliage.
- Project description, evaluation and presentation of results
- Informal oral presentation by entrant(s) on judging day and QA responses.

IN ALL CLASSES POINTS FOR PROTEIN WILL BE ALLOTTED AS FOLLOWS:

1. Hard Varieties:

15 points will be awarded for entries with a protein content of the Australian Wheat Board standards.

An increase of ½ point will be awarded for each 0.2% protein above the set standard to the level of 13.5% protein where maximum points will be awarded.

2. APW/ASW Varieties:

15 points will be awarded for entries with a protein content conforming to Australian Wheat Board standards. An increase of $\frac{1}{2}$ point will be awarded for each 0.2% protein above the set standard to the level of 13.0% protein where maximum points will be awarded and a reduction of $\frac{1}{2}$ for each 0.1% protein below the set standard will also apply.

3. Soft Varieties:

Maximum points for an entry with a protein content between 8.0% and 9.0%. A reduction of ½ point for each 0.1% protein content below 8.0% and above 9.0%.

Exhibitors must nominate in which zone the wheat has been grown and to which silo the wheat is delivered.
