Exhibitors should note that the General Regulations contain a number of provisions relevant to competitions and this Schedule including but not limited to, offences, penalties, prohibited drugs. As those conditions apply in addition to the regulations contained within this schedule, Exhibitors should familiarise themselves with the General Regulations.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are reminded that the Special Regulations contained within this Schedule are merely supplementary to and subject to the General Regulations.

The members of the Society's Art, Craft, Cookery & Technology Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Society to take any necessary action under these Special Regulations.

TRANSFERS

Please ensure the exhibits are entered in the correct class at the time of entry. No exhibit will be transferred to another class after the closing date of entries.

ENTRY SIZE

Maximum size of articles (unless otherwise specified), for display in Handicraft cabinets, must be 1000 mm high by 1000 mm. (Measurement taken diagonally across the base for 3 dimensional exhibits)

DELIVERY

All exhibits to be delivered to the **Duncan Gallery, Goodwood Road, Adelaide Showground, via Rose Terrace entrance.** Exhibits must be delivered and collected at the times stated below and be accompanied by the Society computer printout of entry details.

Posted Exhibits to be received at the RAHS Administration Office at the Showgrounds by 12 noon on Friday 15 August 2024. Once exhibits have been received, the pavilion will be closed for judging.

If you have entered multiple classes, you are welcome to deliver all entries with the first entry due for the week.

EXHIBIT COLLECTION

All exhibits can be collected on Tuesday 9 September during 9am and 12noon or 5:30pm – 7:00pm. Costumes and Model Engineering Train to be collected Tuesday 9 September 12 noon to 2.00pm.

Items not collected will be kept until Friday 19 September after which time they will be forfeited by the winner.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

Please read the schedule carefully, as changes may have occurred from previous years. Exhibits may be rejected if they do not fit the criteria as printed.

- In all classes an exhibit can only compete in one class.
- Exhibits must be solely the work of the Individual.
- Exhibitors entering group/collaborative classes must nominate one name only as a representative on the entry form.
- No exhibit which is known to have been entered at a previous Royal Adelaide Show will be accepted.
- The exhibit must have been completed within the last 2 years prior to the closing date of the Royal Adelaide Show unless otherwise stated.
- Unfinished items or incomplete exhibits will not be judged.
- The Society will not accept responsibility for any exhibit entered in a wrong class.
- The Society will not under any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss, damage to, or mis-delivery of any exhibit.

- The judges are empowered to award a prize, whether there be one or more exhibits, providing they deem the exhibit worthy. They may award second prize in lieu of first or third prize in lieu of second.
- The judge's decision is final, and no correspondence may be entered in to.

Junior Classes, Exhibitors should note that by entering a junior class they are acknowledging that a parent, guardian or teacher has confirmed that the work entered is the original and unaided work of the exhibitor and can be verified if requested.

Dressmaking, Knitting, Lace and Crochet Classes: articles should be as new.

Pottery Classes: open exhibits must be glazed and fired.

To maintain a respectable standard of competition all entries are accepted at the discretion of the Society and subject to a selection process prior to judging and display. If your work is not selected for judging and display, you will be notified by the Society and your entries will be available for collection after the Show on Tuesday 9 September 2025. Exhibits may be removed from display if the exhibit represents or contains:

- · Weapons or inferred weapons, intentionally or otherwise.
- · Images that are offensive in a sexual or discriminatory manner, intentionally or otherwise.
- Information that is offensive, indiscrete, defamatory, intentionally, or otherwise.

DISPLAY OF EXHIBITS

The Society reserves the right to display only prize-winning exhibits should the number of entries exceed the display space available.

EXHIBIT CARDS

After entries have closed, exhibit cards will be EMAILED to exhibitors and must accompany each entry.

These cards should be securely fastened to entries (with at least 40 cm of string/ribbon) so that the card is clearly seen when the work is displayed, and will enable prize ribbons to be attached effectively.

Safety pins only must be used to attach exhibit cards, when pinning is required

Every separate article of a set must bear the exhibit number and be attached to the set by mounting.

Exhibits must not have any identification markings or names, other than the exhibit cards supplied by the Society. Exhibits showing identification names/business names and/or logos will be disqualified.

Please ensure exhibit cards are attached to the correct exhibit as each card will have a unique barcode printed to assist with scanning of card at delivery and collection of exhibits.

WITHDRAWALS

All withdrawals must be made in writing and can be sent via email to entries@adelaideshowground.com.au. Emails must include "Withdrawal" in the subject line and the section (e.g. Handicrafts), exhibitor name, class number/s, exhibit number (if known) and exhibit name (if applicable). Withdrawals must be made at least 24 hours prior to judging.

PRIZES & AWARDS

First: \$25 and ribbon Second: \$10 and ribbon

Third: ribbon.

Judges may also choose to award a 4th place ribbon for any class with 10-15 exhibits and a commended ribbon for any class with over 16 exhibits.

PAYMENT OF PRIZE MONEY

All prize money won during the Royal Adelaide Show will be paid by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) only. Exhibitors will need to ensure they have supplied their details to receive any prize payment.

PRIZE MONEY WILL BE PAID BY THE END OF OCTOBER.

Any prize money not claimed by 1 December of the current year, shall be deemed forfeited by the exhibitor and the RA&HS shall no longer be liable to pay or provide the prize.

PRIZE MONEY AND GST

Prize money as stated in the Prize Schedule does not include GST.

The prize money which we pay to successful exhibitors depends on information provided to us. If you confirm that you are GST registered and provide your Australian Business Number (ABN), we will pay the appropriate prize money plus 10% GST. We will provide you with a Recipient Created Tax Invoice which you will need to submit to the Australian Taxation Office.

If you confirm you are registered for GST, in entering the competition, you acknowledge your agreement to the following:

You will not issue a tax invoice to the RA&HS in respect to prize money received.

You will notify the RA&HS if you cease to be registered for GST.

If you provide your Australian Business Number but are not registered for GST, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to the GST.

If you confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Prize Schedule without reference to GST.

IMPORTANT

It is important that you either:

Confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, or Confirm you are entering as a GST registered business and supply your ABN

Failure to do either of the above will cause the RA&HS to withhold 48.5% of your prize money in accordance with Australian tax legislation.

The RA&HS is not a tax consultant and therefore assumes no liability for actions taken as a result of these guidelines. In any instances where an entrant or sponsor is uncertain of the tax implications of their involvement, they should consult their own accountant or tax advisor.

The Society makes every endeavour to ensure all prizes listed are accurate at the time of publishing. Should a cash prize be withdrawn by a sponsor after publishing, the prize will revert back to the competition's default amount where applicable. Vouchers, products, or trophies withdrawn by a sponsor after publishing will not be replaced. It is the responsibility of the prize winner to follow up with the Society any sponsored prize (cash, voucher, product, trophy) they believe they are entitled to prior to 30 November in the year of the prize being awarded. The Exhibits in Class 2 will not be returned to the Exhibitor at the end of the Royal Show but will be retained by the RA&HS to be presented to the Women's & Children's Hospital on behalf of the Exhibitors.

Class 2 THE INSPIRATIONS MAGAZINE PRIZE Cuddle Toy, suitable for children.

Please note the following conditions:

- 1. Toy must be made from all NEW materials.
- 2. Toy must come from a smoke free environment.
- 3. Toy must not contain any animal or pet hair.
- 4. Any eyes or other embellishments must be firmly sewn on and not glued.

The judging criteria will include the usual standards of toy construction, tensions where applicable, appropriateness of fabrics & yarns, originality and finishing plus the suitability of a toy as a cuddle/comfort toy for a child.

The toy may be crocheted, knitted, machine or hand made from fur, felt or fabric and suitable for a child 3 years and over.

Class 3 Junior, any type of decorated egg. Under 16 Years of Age. Age is at 30th August 2024.

THE EGG ARTISTRY GUILD OF AUSTRALIA INC TROPHY JUNIOR CHAMPION EGG

Special: Trophy (\$20) sponsored by Egg Artistry Guild of Australia

NOVICE

A novice is an exhibitor who has not won first prize in an Egg Artistry class at a Royal Adelaide Show.

Class 4 Diorama/Trinket Box, any size egg.

Decorated with one or more openings (diorama) or a hinged lid (trinket)

OPEN

Class 5 Diorama, any size egg into which a 3D setting or figurine has been placed.

The egg may have one or more openings.

Class 6 Elaborately Decorated, or, Intricate Cut, any size egg, incorporating filigree or difficult cutting, lattice, lace or similar cutting in the design.

Class 7 Clock/Mechanical/Lighting, any size egg.

Mechanical: Incorporating a Mechanism resulting in movement within the design.

Lighting: Items used result in substantial lighting effect in the egg.

Class 8 Beading, any size egg, incorporating bead or stonework (rhinestone) or diamond painting as part of the design.

Class 9 Theme Egg: Any size egg, decorated in such a way that honours the years. 2025 Theme: Afternoon Tea.

Class 10 Open, any size egg.

that does not reasonably fit into any other category.

THE EGG ARTISTRY GUILD OF AUSTRALIA INC TROPHY CHAMPION EGG

Special: Trophy (\$60) sponsored by Egg Artistry Guild of Australia

Class 11 Kit & Seminar Eggs.

Any size or any type egg, decorated in any fashion.

The egg may have been taught at a seminar or completed using a purchased kit including supplies and instructions. Eggs entered in this class will not be eligible for Champion Egg.

COMPUTERISED MACHINE EMBROIDERY

Class 12 THE MELANN'S FABRICS & SEWING CENTRE PRIZE Quilt, machine embroidered.

Can include any other sewing techniques.

First: Voucher (\$50)

Class 13 Purse or Bag, featuring machine embroidery.

Can include any other machine sewing techniques.

Class 14 THE MELANN'S FABRICS & SEWING CENTRE PRIZE Garment - Embellished, featuring machine embroidery.

The garment need not be your own creation, it could be a purchased garment, or one made by you, embellished with machine embroidery.

First: Voucher (\$50)

Class 15 Garment, featuring machine embroidery.

The garment must be made by you and the embroidery should be featured in the construction.

Class 16 Tablecloth or runner, featuring machine embroidery, any size, any shape.

Class 17 An Article Featuring Machine Embroidered Lace.

The lace must be free standing, without being stitched out onto fabric, other than where the lace is attached, if it is an attached lace edge.

Class 18 An Article Featuring Digitised Machine Embroidery.

This embroidery must be digitised by you starting with a JPEG or BMP file and working files, showing progressive steps of the creation of the stitch file to complete the design, must be included with your entry.

Class 19 Picture, machine embroidered.

This could be in the form of a wall hanging, framed picture or a feature panel for a carry bag or the like, using a combination of designs to create an artistic piece.

Class 20 Cushion, featuring machine embroidery where a combination of designs creates the feature.

Cushion to be no smaller than 40cm square.

Class 21 Machine Embroidered embellished on a Knitted Jumper.

The garment need not be your own creation, it could be a purchased or hand/machine knitted garment embellished with machine embroidery.

Class 22 Any Other Article, not included elsewhere, including freehand machine embroidery, and machine applique.

MOST OUTSTANDING EXHIBIT IN COMPUTERISED MACHINE EMBROIDERY

EMBROIDERY

JUDGING

Judges will take into consideration the following points:

- · Excellence of technique
- · Design and colour choice
- · Original interpretation
- · Finish and presentation

Embroidered pictures must be mounted or framed.

All embroidered articles must be finished off.

The size of an article is measured overall including frames.

Embroidery worked by hand unless otherwise specified.

Maximum size of articles for display in Handicraft cabinets, must be 1000mm high by 1000mm. Tablecloths and quilts no restrictions.

Exhibit card to be attached with at least 50 cm of ribbon/cotton tape to enable prize ribbons to be displayed effectively.

EMBROIDERY DEFINITIONS

- Canvas work (Embroidered Tapestry) is worked on embroidery canvas, either single or double thread, using any suitable stitch or combination of stitches. Stitching should not necessarily entirely cover the ground canvas.
- Rug Stitches are worked with a Tapestry needle. They can be looped, knotted or flat stitches such as Astrakan (velvet) stitch, Turkey Knot and Soumak stitch.
- Petit Point is worked on fine canvas, linen, or silk gauze, with a count of no less than ten threads per centimetre. The background need not be stitched.
- Counted Work any embroidery worked by counting the threads of the fabric.
- Surface Stitchery refers to all those embroideries that worked freely across the surface of the fabric without the necessity of counting the threads.
- Fabric Manipulated any colour NO CUT THREADS e.g. Pulled fabric, Casalguidi, Schwalm (no drawn threads).

EMBROIDERY

Class 23 Embroidery, any article, using free motion machining, not computerised.

Class 24 Cutwork, counted, any colour.

Where threads are removed following the count of the fabric eg. Hardanger, Ukrainian, Ruskin Lace, Schwalm (if threads are drawn).

Class 25 THE CREATE IN STITCH PRIZE Counted Work.

Any embroidery worked by counting the threads of the fabric other than tapestry or cross stitch. E.g. tablecloth First: Voucher (\$30) Sponsored by Create in Stitch

Class 26 Cutwork, fabric cut to the design.

E.g. Richelieu, Maderia, Broderie Anglaise.

Class 27 THE MELANN'S FABRICS & SEWING CENTRE PRIZE Surface Stitchery, coloured embroidery, any article

Hand embroidered.

First: Voucher (\$50)

Class 28 Surface Stitchery, white work, any article

Hand embroidered

ROYAL ADELAIDE SHOW - EXHIBITORS CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

HAZARD REPORTING

Exhibitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Control Centre immediately of any hazards detected. Hazards are any situation which has the potential to cause:

- 1. Injury, illness or death to people or animals either immediately or in the future
- 2. Damage or destruction to property

INCIDENT REPORTING

Exhibitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Management Office immediately an incident occurs which has resulted in:

- 1. The injury, illness or death of any person or animal
- 2. The damage, destruction or loss of property
- 3. A near miss incident that could have resulted in the consequences listed in 1 and 2

WASTE DISPOSAL

All waste including liquids must be disposed of responsibly and placed in the appropriate bin or receptacle. Storm drains must not be used for the disposal of any waste.

HAZARD MINIMISATION

All areas must be kept in a clean and tidy order with clearly defined and available access and exit routes at all times. Build-up of combustible waste must be avoided.

Care must be taken to minimise trip hazards and obstacles that people may walk into.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The RA&HS are to be advised of all hazardous materials that are brought onto the Showground. Appropriate warning signs and Safety Data Sheets (SDS) will need to be provided before allowing these materials on site. SDS are to be available onsite and provided immediately upon request by an RA&HS Representative.

MEDIA COMMENTS

Any public comment on emergencies, incidents or other venue matters should only come from the RA&HS. The key media spokesperson for the RA&HS is the Marketing Manager.

DUTY OF CARE

It is important to ensure your own safety and that of all other site personnel, visitors and general public at the Adelaide Showground.

All exhibitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to situations which could lead to injury. This "Duty of Care" extends to the prevention of damage to property.

LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY

1. Release

Entry to and remaining on the Showground is entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor and to the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor releases the Society (which term includes in this clause the Society's officers, employees, members and agents), from all claims and demands of every kind resulting from any accident, damage or injury occurring at the Showground, and without limitation, the Exhibitor acknowledges:

- **a)** the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibit;
- **b**) the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees and Agents;
- c) the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to a Motor Vehicle or any of its contents whilst it is located on the Showground; and
- **d)** without limiting Regulations 1 (a), 1 (b) and (c) above, the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury resulting from the sale, treatment, failure to treat, destruction, disposal or other dealing with any Exhibit, or for loss, damage or injury to any personal belongings, equipment or property brought onto the Showground.

2. Indemnity

To the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor must indemnify and keep indemnified the Society and its officers,

employees, members and agents from and against all actions, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses and liabilities including without limitation, consequential loss and loss of profits for which the Society is or may be or become liable in respect of or arising from:

- a) loss, damage or injury to any person in connection with the Exhibit or the relevant Event;
- b) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to any other Exhibit or Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, Agents, or to the property of the Society, or its members, or to the general public, caused or contributed to or by any act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents; and
- c) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to the Exhibit, or the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, or Agents caused or contributed by an act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the transportation, feeding or housing of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor.

3. Removal from Showground

Without prejudice to any other provision in these Regulations, where the Society, its officers, employees, members or agents removes an Exhibit, or causes an Exhibit to be removed from the Showground, the Exhibit is removed or caused to be removed entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor. The person or persons removing the Exhibit will be deemed to be the agent of the Exhibitor, and his or her acts and omissions will be deemed to be the acts and omissions of the Exhibitor.

4 Insurance

The Society will arrange Animal Exhibitors Public Liability insurance cover for all Exhibitors of Exhibits being animals. The Exhibitor is bound by the terms and conditions of this insurance and by Statutory Duties as defined under the Insurance Contracts Act (1984). Details of the Animal Exhibitors Public Liability insurance are set out in the Relevant Schedule. The Society does not insure first party loss, damage or injury to Exhibits, and Exhibitors should consider purchasing insurance if required.

5. Personal effects

The Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss or damage caused to personal belongings, equipment or property which is brought onto the Showground by an Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Emergency information and Emergency Assembly Points for the various animal pavilions and stables will be included with Exhibitor List of Entries and Notice to Exhibitor notifications. Competitors should be familiar with these plans.

FIRST AID

During the Royal Adelaide Show, St John provides First Aid Services but it is suggested that competitors have a basic First Aid kit for minor medical requirements.

St John is not in attendance after public hours.

For emergency contact details, check Notice Boards for onsite assistance or dial 000 for a medical emergency.

RA&HS EMERGENCY FACILITIES

Firefighting and other emergency equipment must not be removed or used for any other purpose. Missing or unserviceable equipment should be reported to the Venue Control Centre immediately.

SMOKING

Smoking is only permitted in designated locations. The Royal Adelaide Show is a smoke free event.

TRAFFIC CONTROL

The RA&HS Traffic Control Policy imposes speed restrictions within the Showground. For the duration of the Royal Adelaide Show the speed limit is 10 kph on the grounds and 8 kph inside buildings.

The use of vehicles inside the Showground is closely managed during the Royal Adelaide Show. Conditions of entry will be provided with the issue of Vehicle Entry Permits.
