SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES

All entries must be submitted online www.theshow.com.au

Entries submitted online will be acknowledged via email.

The following conditions will strictly apply:

- All entries must be submitted online through the online entry platform, **paper entries will not be accepted**.
- All entries must be submitted and paid for by 5:00 pm on the entry closing dates stated under "Key Dates".
- A late entry option is available under the following conditions:
 - Late entries may only be submitted online and will be accepted for 7 days after the official closing date (by 5:00 pm CST).
 - An additional fee equivalent to three times the standard entry fee is to be paid.
 - Entry forms by email or facsimile are strictly forbidden and will be destroyed.

Absolutely no exception to the above conditions will be made to any exhibitor under any circumstance.

CLOSING DATE OF ENTRIES

MEMBERSHIP

ALL Exhibitors in the following sections MUST be members of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of SA Inc.

- Show Jumping Classes
- Light and Heavy Harness Classes
- Hack and Hunter Classes

You are not required to be a member if you are an exhibitor in

- Rider/Driver classes only
- Australian Stock Horse Classes only
- Clydesdale Classes only

Membership must be completed prior to completing the online entry and can be done online via www.rahs.com.au/membership or calling (08) 8210 5211 to speak with the Membership Coordinator.

Membership of other Royal Show Societies does not exempt exhibitors.

Members receive:

- One non-transferable Member's Card (unlimited entry for the Member)
- One transferable Member's Guest Pass (unlimited entry for Guest)

ENTRY PASSES

Those exhibitors who are required to be a member will receive access to The Show for themselves and a guest (adult memberships only) through their membership; the below entry passes are in addition to this.

Membership passes are distributed separately to any additional passes for which exhibitors are eligible for.

- One day exhibitors competing in Rider, Australian Stock Horse, Clydesdale, and Individual Hunter classes ONLY: will receive two (2) x One-Day Pass for each day of competition.
- Exhibitors exhibiting more than three (3) horses: will receive 1 additional full Show pass.

WITHDRAWALS

All withdrawals must be made in writing and can be sent via email to: entries@adelaideshowground.com.au

Emailed withdrawals must include "Withdrawal" in the subject line and the section (eg Horse Section), exhibitor name, class number, exhibit number (if known) and exhibit name (if applicable).

No refund of fees (entry, stabling, locker or otherwise) will be made after an exhibitor has been notified of the acceptance of their horse.

A \$20 Administration Fee will be levied on withdrawals made before notification of acceptance.

REFUNDS

No refund of entry fees will be made after an exhibitor has been notified of the acceptance of their horse.

Membership may be refunded by returning all badges and tickets before the commencement of the Show.

Fees for horses, galloways or ponies for which a nomination is made and the entry not accepted shall be refunded MINUS a \$20 Administration Fee.

By exhibiting at The Show you acknowledge that you have read and agree to the privacy policy of the RA&HS which can be viewed here [linked to <https://www.theshow.com.au/contact-us>]

In relation to your entry into a competition we may specifically use and/or disclose your personal information to:

- Communicate competition information to you such as entry opening dates, delivery and collection details and entry ticket distribution
- Publish competition results both online and in printed results listings
- Publish competition entries in Competition Catalogues
- Advise sponsors of competition prize winners for distribution of prizes from both the RA&HS and sponsors

By entering into a competition you consent to your contact details being provided to the sponsors of that competition for the purpose of distributing your prize. You also consent to your name, suburb and postcode being listed in a competition catalogue and, if you are a prize winner your name in competition results.

If you do not wish for your name and address to be printed in a competition catalogue, please ensure that you select the 'Keep Private' option in your online exhibitor profile.

ENTIRE

- An entire horse, galloway or pony will not be permitted to compete in sections other than Jumping, Harness and Australian Stock Horse classes.
- An entire horse, galloway or pony are not permitted in Grand Parades.
- An entire horse, galloway or pony must be identified by a green disc.

NOTICE

- It is a condition of your entry that the Society reserves the right to accept, reject or cancel any entry at any time without being bound to give any reason.
- Any exhibitor who supplies incorrect information on an entry form is liable to disqualification.
- In all classes, unless four or more nominations are received, the Committee reserves the right to cancel or merge the class.

RIDER AGE REQUIREMENTS

The age of an exhibitor is determined as the age as of 30 August 2025. All riders must be capable of exercising complete control over their horse.

Exhibitors must declare the age and or date of birth at the time of entry where stipulated. Proof of age must be provided on the day of the event if requested by the RA&HS Ring Steward or other authorised person.

All riders must be suitably mounted. The Judge's decision in this respect is final.

TRANSFERS

Please ensure the exhibits are entered in the correct class at the time of entry. No exhibit will be transferred to another class after the closing date of entries.

Exhibits may be transferred for height reasons after being measured by the official Society measurer. If an exhibit measures over or under the height class/es in which they entered, they must nominate which class/es they wish to transfer to when there is no equivalent class.

REGISTRATION

All horses, galloways and ponies entered in any class must be registered with Equestrian Australia (hereafter referred to as EA), Show Horse Council of Australasia or any other organisations acceptable to the Committee.

A photocopy, back and front, of the current Registration certificate **MUST** be supplied when lodging entries for all horses, galloways or ponies; including those registered within South Australia.

Entries submitted online **MUST** have the registration papers attached before the entry/ies are submitted.

Harness, Clydesdales, and Australian Stock Horse exhibits only, are exempt from these registration requirements.

OWNERSHIP

All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor or held by the exhibitor under a written and recorded lease at the time of entry.

The exhibitor is responsible for the care and control of the Exhibit on the Showground and compliance with the Rules and Regulations.

The owner of the Exhibit must also be the listed Society Member.

PRIZES

Prize ribbons will be as listed in each category.

In pairs classes ribbons will be awarded to each placed horse in the team.

Champions will be selected from first prize winners and Reserve Champions from remaining first prize winners and the second prize winner in the class that supplied the Champion.

PAYMENT OF PRIZE MONEY

Any prize money won during the Royal Adelaide Show is paid by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). The Exhibitor should provide the BSB, Account Number and Account Name when entering.

PRIZE MONEY WILL BE PAID BY THE END OF OCTOBER.

PRIZE MONEY AND GST

Prize money as stated in the Prize Schedule does not include GST.

The prize money which we pay to successful exhibitors depends on information provided to us. If you confirm that you are GST registered and provide your Australian Business Number (ABN), we will pay the appropriate prize money plus 10% GST. We will provide you with a Recipient Created Tax Invoice which you will need to submit to the Australian Taxation Office.

If you confirm you are registered for GST, in entering the competition, you acknowledge your agreement to the following:

- You will not issue a tax invoice to the RA&HS in respect to prize money received;
- You will notify the RA&HS if you cease to be registered for GST.

If you provide your Australian Business Number but are not registered for GST, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Competition Schedule without reference to the GST.

If you confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, we will pay the prize money as detailed in the Competition Schedule without reference to GST.

IMPORTANT

It is important that you either:

- Confirm you are entering as part of a private recreational pursuit or hobby, or
- Confirm you are entering as a GST registered business and supply your ABN

Failure to do either of the above will require the RA&HS to withhold tax, at the maximum tax rate, from your prize money in accordance with Australian tax legislation. The RA&HS is not a tax consultant and therefore assumes no liability for actions taken as a result of these guidelines. In any instances where an entrant or sponsor is uncertain of the tax implications of their involvement, they should consult their own accountant or tax advisor.

The Society makes every endeavor to ensure all prizes listed are accurate at the time of publishing. Should a cash prize be withdrawn by a sponsor subsequent to publishing, the prize will revert back to the competitions default amount where applicable. Vouchers, product or trophies withdrawn by a sponsor subsequent to publishing will not be replaced. It is the responsibility of the prize winner to follow-up with the Society any sponsored prize (cash, voucher, product, trophy) they believe they are entitled to **prior to 30 November in the year of the prize being awarded**. The Society will not follow-up prize sponsors after this date or review any prizes that may have been incorrectly awarded.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are reminded that the Society's General Regulations apply to all sections of the Show. A copy of the General Regulations can be obtained from the Society's website at www.theshow.com.au or from the Society's Administration Office. Exhibitors should note that the General Regulations contain a number of provisions relevant to competitions and this Schedule including but not limited to, offences, penalties, prohibited drugs. As those conditions apply in addition to the regulations contained within this schedule, Exhibitors should familiarise themselves with the General Regulations.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are reminded that the Special Regulations contained within this Schedule are merely supplementary to and subject to the General Regulations.

The members of the Society's Horse Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Society to take any necessary action under these Special Regulations.

PENALTY FOR NON-EXHIBITION OF ANIMALS

Following advice from the Society of acceptance of their nomination/s, any exhibitor whose exhibit becomes unable to compete for any reason must notify the Society in writing prior to the first day of the Royal Adelaide Show, that their exhibit/s are unable to compete. Exhibitors who fail to scratch prior to the commencement of the Royal Adelaide Show may be fined \$200 for each exhibit not scratched and may be disqualified from competing at future Royal Adelaide Shows.

PERFORMANCES REQUIREMENTS

Performances of each horse, galloway or pony must be stated on the entry form for Harness, Hack, Show Hunter, Australian Stock Horse and Jumping classes.

The schedule of classes is divided into ten (9) main sections.

1. Rider/Driver Classes
2. Harness classes
3. Hack classes
4. Show Hunter classes.
5. Racehorse to Show horse Classes
6. Child's Classes
7. Australian Stock Horse Classes
8. Clydesdale Classes
9. Jumping contest (groups A, B and C)

A separate entry and performance form is required for each section for each horse, galloway or pony nominated. Performances must only be obtained from within the same section for which the horse, galloway or pony is being nominated. For example: if entering as a Hack, performances gained as a Hunter will not be accepted.

The information contained on the entry form will determine which nominations will be accepted by the Society. If incomplete or inaccurate information is provided, the exhibitor may not be recognised. The Society will then notify all nominations of their acceptance or non-acceptance for competition at this year's Royal Adelaide Show. The Society will not consider any further performances or information which is provided after entries have closed.

HORSE COMPETITORS - PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

Minimum qualifying performances required to enter the Horse section at the 2025 Royal Adelaide show are listed below:

AGRICULTURAL SHOW PERFORMANCES MUST BE OBTAINED FROM AFFILIATED AGRICULTURAL SHOWS.

PERFORMANCES RECOGNISED

The Society will only recognise performances from competitions which are affiliated with:

- Equestrian Australia
- Show Horse Council Australasia
- Federal Council of Agricultural Societies

- or Affiliated Agricultural Shows

Exhibits entering Hack classes must qualify and compete as a Hack only.

Exhibits entering Hunter classes must qualify and compete as a Hunter only.

Exhibits may only enter and compete in EITHER Hack or Hunter classes.

Exhibitors are urged to read the following to ensure performances listed on entry forms meet the acceptance requirements.

MINIMUM QUALIFYING PERFORMANCES – HACK & HUNTER CLASSES

Competitors must obtain the minimum performances as stated below to nominate for the 2025 Royal Adelaide Show competition for Hack, Galloway Hack, Pony Hack, Hunter, Galloway Hunter, Pony Hunter and Equestrian/Smartest on Parade classes:

Two (2) first placings in an open height or weight or Lady's or Gentleman's class in the current season (ie) 23 June 2024 to 22 June 2025 at two (2) separate agricultural shows affiliated with the Agricultural Societies Council.

No more than one (1) win per day per show will be accepted as a qualifying performance.

OR

One (1) first placings and two (2) second placings in an open height or weight or Lady's or Gentleman's class in the current season (ie) 23 June 2024 to 22 June 2025 at three (3) separate agricultural shows affiliated with the Agricultural Societies Council.

No more than one (1) win/placing per day per show will be accepted as a qualifying performance.

OR

Four (4) second placings in an open height or weight or Lady's or Gentleman's class in the current season (ie) 23 June 2024 to 22 June 2025 at four (4) separate agricultural shows affiliated with the Agricultural Societies Council.

No more than one (1) win/placing per day per show will be accepted as a qualifying performance.

Any Champion Hack, Champion Galloway Hack, Champion Pony Hack, Champion Show Hunter Horse, Champion Show Hunter Galloway or Champion Show Hunter Pony gained at any capital city Royal Show (including State and Territory capital city Royal Shows) in the 12 months prior to the closing date of entries will gain automatic acceptance to compete at the forthcoming Royal Adelaide Show.

Qualified Hacks and Show Hunters may also enter Smartest on Parade and Leading Rein classes.

- No more than two (2) Hack or Show Hunter rings at any one show will be considered for qualifications.
- To be accepted for Hack classes your performances must be from Hack classes.
- To be accepted for Hunter classes your performance must be from Hunter classes.

OBTAINING THE MINIMUM QUALIFYING PERFORMANCES DOES NOT GUARANTEE ACCEPTANCE FOR COMPETITION.

ADDITIONAL PERFORMANCES

Exhibitors are advised to list additional winning performances to nominate for acceptance in the Royal Adelaide Show competition for Hack, Galloway Hack, Pony Hack, Show Hunter Horse, Show Hunter Galloway and Show Hunter Pony classes.

It is expected that entries will be high, and additional performances will be required in the event of a ballot.

Performances must be achieved at:

- Shows affiliated with the Federal Council of Agricultural Societies.
- Placings 1 to 6 in any ridden Hack or Show Hunter class (competing singly) at any Royal Show (including State and Territory capital city Royal Shows)
- Wins in any ridden Hack or Show Hunter class (competing singly) in the current season at EA or EA affiliated shows.
- Wins in any ridden Hack or Show Hunter class (competing singly) in the current season at Show Horse Council or Show Horse Council affiliated shows.

These performances will only be recognised as winning performances after the minimum qualifying performances have been achieved.

Events which do NOT count as acceptable performances (at shows other than State or Territory capital city Royal Shows) are:

- a. Maiden classes
- b. Hack or Hunter classes restricted by breed, colour or age
- c. Hack or Hunter classes restricted by a district
- d. Classes at unaffiliated events
- e. Pleasure and/or education and/or paced classes
- f. Riding and/or turnout classes
- g. Consolation Hack or Hunter classes
- h. Pairs, teams etc classes
- i. Child's classes
- j. Combined training classes
- k. Pony Club classes
- l. Novice Champion and/or Novice Hack or Hunter classes
- m. Elementary classes
- n. Intermediate classes
- o. Leading Rein and/or Smartest on Parade classes/ fancy dress
- p. Newcomer classes

FROM THE PERFORMANCES LISTED ON THE ENTRY FORM, THE SOCIETY WILL AT ITS DISCRETION, DETERMINE ACCEPTANCE.

All rules and regulations relating to the Horse section are subject to change without notice.

All horses entered in competitive classes must be microchipped and have that chip recorded with a recognised National Registry.

LEADING REIN & RIDDEN SHETLAND PONY CLASSES

Exhibitors wishing to complete ONLY in Leading Rein class/es or Ridden Shetland Pony class/es are not required to obtain qualifying performances.

HARNESS, RIDER, STOCKHORSE AND CLYDESDALES

Exhibitors wishing to complete ONLY in Harness, Rider/Driver, Stockhorse or Clydesdale class/es are not required to obtain qualifying performances.

JUMPING CONTEST (GROUP A, B AND C)

Exhibitors must state their best six (6) performances from 23 June 2024 until 22 June 2025 along with their best six (6) performances prior to 22 June 2024 (maximum of 12 months prior).

SITE ACCESS

Horses will not be permitted to enter the Showground **before 8.00am on Wednesday 27 August** under any circumstances. Entry for horses is via the Leader Street entrance or Leader Street 3 Carpark depending on the day and time.

Access to the site is outlined below

- From 8:00am on Wednesday 27 August to 9:30pm on Friday 29 August – all arrivals enter via Main Leader Street Gate.
- From 9:30pm till 6:00am, Wednesday 27 August to Sunday 7 September – all arrivals and departures to enter via Leader Street Gate.
- From 6:00am till 9:30pm, Saturday 30 August to Sunday 7 September – all arrivals and departures to enter via Leader Street 3 Car Park (horses to be walked in via Leader Street 3 Carpark access point)

An exit permit and departure time must be obtained from the Stabling Coordinator prior to departure.

Exhibitors may not remove their horse/s before a Grand Parade (if programmed).

During the Show, no horse is permitted onto the Showground prior to the night before the first day of allocated stabling.

Parking on the Showgrounds is strictly prohibited! For the loading and unloading of exhibits, a duration limit of 45 minutes for cars and floats and 60 minutes for trucks is allowed. An Infringement Notice will be issued should the time limit be exceeded. Prior to arrival, the exhibitor must apply for a temporary vehicle permit which if approved will entitle the nominated vehicle to access the site for the purpose of unloading or loading. At the time of application, the vehicle registration, the name of the driver and their

mobile phone number will need to be provided. An email will be sent to confirmed exhibitors advising how to apply for a vehicle permit.

On arrival at the Showground, exhibitors who do not display the Vehicle Permit and do not provide correct information on the Vehicle Permit, will **NOT** be permitted to enter the Showground. The Vehicle Permit must be displayed in clear view on the dashboard of the vehicle upon entering the Showground and while loading and unloading. Once the Show has commenced, only the driver will be admitted free but will be required to produce a pass when re-entering the Showground after removal of their vehicle.

Caravans are **NOT** permitted on the Showground.

ONLY horses accepted for competition are permitted on the Showground.

All cars, floats and trucks must be removed from the Showground by 7:30 am daily.

There is no vehicle access to the Showground between 6:00 am and 9:30 pm during the Royal Adelaide Show.

PLEASE REFER TO THE 2025 HORSES IN ACTION TIMETABLE TO DETERMINE WHICH DAY/S YOU WILL REQUIRE STABLING AND LOCKERS.

STABLES AND LOCKERS

BOOKINGS

Bookings for stables and lockers will be done through the online **Nominate platform**. Bookings will open as per below.

- From Monday 14 July - Harness Section and Exhibitors with 5+ Horses
- From Monday 21 July – All other sections

Information on stable layouts and process will be available on the website in advance and an email will be sent to all accepted competitors to confirm the process prior to bookings opening. For price information on stalls and lockers, please refer to page 2. The onus is on the exhibitor to ensure stalls and lockers are booked for the correct days.

Unless a horse is nominated and competes in at least two events excluding rider classes a stall will not be allocated.

A limited number of stalls and lockers are available on the Showground, so we urge exhibitors to consider their accommodation requirements for 2025 and plan accordingly. Depending on entries received local horses may not get a stall. The Society reserves the right to alter stall and locker allocations at any time should such action be considered necessary and may allocate another stall or locker to the exhibitor.

Should the number of applications received exceed the number of lockers available, the Society will require exhibitors with one horse to share a locker with another exhibitor. Exhibitors with one horse are requested to indicate on the Stabling/Locker Request form with whom they would be prepared to share a locker if required. If exhibitors do not state a name, the sharing will be determined by the Society.

Exhibitors must supply their own locks for their locker. Items left in lockers are the exhibitors responsibility, and no liability will be accepted by the Society for damaged or lost items. A limited supply of padlocks and keys will be available for sale through the Stabling Coordinator and main office.

Stables are to be used for the sole purpose of **stabling horses only**, the use of the stable for any other purpose such as accommodation, storage of fodder, bedding or tack etc is strictly forbidden. Any exhibitor acting in breach of this regulation will be fined \$200 for each stable per day and may, at the discretion of the Committee, be disqualified from competing at the current Show, in which event any Award that the exhibitor may have won at that Show is also forfeited.

An exhibitor who has not occupied the stable that has been allocated to them by 8.00 am on the day of allocation (from Saturday 30 August onwards) is advised that the stable will be deemed vacant and all payment received by the RA&HS in association with the stable/s will be forfeited. The stable will likely be reallocated to an alternative exhibitor.

Whilst the Society will consider stabling requests, no guarantee is made that they will be met.

- Horses which are nominated in one or two classes only may be removed on the day on which they have competed but not before a Grand Parade (if programmed). Stables will not be allotted for these horses and exhibitors must notify the Society at the time of lodging entries that the horse will be removed.
- Exhibitors of horses which have been allocated a stall may remove their horses at a time approved by the Stabling Coordinator (but not before a Grand Parade) providing a deposit of \$50 is lodged with the Society. This deposit will be refunded provided that the horse is returned before 8:00 am on the following day.

CARE OF STALLS/LOCKERS

Numbers or any other identification marks which may have been placed on or in a stable or locker by the Society, whether by placard, painting, posting or any other means, must not be removed, disfigured or altered in any way, nor shall any other notice, number or mark be placed in or upon any stall or box other than by the order of the Society.

Screens, rugs or any other obstruction which may obscure the interior of the stall to the public must not be used during daylight hours.

Stables shall be used only by animals entered for competition and for the purpose for which they have been allocated to the exhibitor.

The consumption of intoxicating liquor in lockers and adjacent areas is forbidden.

The observance of the above regulations will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Infringement of these regulations will result in the cancellation of the stall or locker in question and all money paid will be forfeited.

STABLE CLEANING

Exhibitors will always, to the satisfaction of the Society:

- Keep each stall allotted to them and their animals in a clean and proper condition throughout the Show.
- Clean out their stalls regularly. Refuse must be deposited in manure bins provided.
- Manure must not be deposited in alleyways or general-purpose rubbish bins.
- General purpose rubbish must not be deposited in manure bins.
- Leave each stall allotted to them and their animals in a clean and proper condition on departure.

BEDDING

- Sawdust and/or shavings will be the only horse bedding used on the Showgrounds.
- Bedding will be placed by the Society but is the responsibility of the exhibitor to lay out.
- Exhibitors of hacks occupying a stall in the second half of the Show will be issued two bedding tickets by the Stabling Coordinator at the time of stall allocation.
- Exhibitors may buy additional bags of sawdust and/or shavings from the fodder store during the Show.

MEASURING

ALL horses entered in the 2025 Royal Adelaide Show must be presented to be identified by the Official Measurer before competing.

Any horse not presented for identification before it's first competition will not be allowed to compete.

- EA & Show Horse Council current & life measuring certificates will be accepted on presentation of animal to be identified.
- A microchip registration certificate is required if details are not listed on breed/registration papers.
- When presenting your horse, please have a current copy of relevant breed/registration papers and the breastplate number.

Horses competing in height restricted Classes must be measured.

Any horse competing in a height restricted Class that is not presented for measuring will not be allowed to compete.

Horses will not be measured unless the breastplate number is produced to the Official Measurer.

Any Exhibitor who by himself/herself or any agent:

- directly or indirectly presents a horse which has an identity other than its true identity,
- does any act or thing which is likely to result in a horse being incorrectly identified,
- does any act or thing which is likely to result in a horse being incorrectly measured, or presents a horse for measuring when the horse has had any Prohibited Substance administered to it,

is automatically disqualified from Exhibiting in any Class at the Show.

The Committee reserves the right to re-measure horses at any time during the Royal Show.

Following the recording of a measurement, exhibitors may apply to the RA&HS of SA Inc to receive a certificate stating the recorded measurement where a fee of \$20 will apply. Once the certificate is issued, the exhibitor is permitted to use the certificate for whatever purpose they choose, provided the exhibitor acknowledges that the Society accepts no responsibility for the accuracy of the measurement following the Royal Adelaide Show performance and that the certificate has a 12 month currency expiring one week prior to the immediate and following years programmed Royal Adelaide Show commencement date. For more detailed information on measuring, please refer to "Measuring" in the Competition Schedule.

STANDARD HEIGHTS

Hacks - over 15 hands (1524 mm).

Galloways - over 14 hands (1422 mm) and not exceeding 15 hands (1524 mm).

Ponies - not exceeding 14 hands (1422 mm).

NOT TO STANDARD

The Society reserves the right to exclude from competition;

- Horses that are not up to standard.
- Horses not exhibited in Show condition.
- Horses not given proper attention during the Show.
- Riders who disregard instructions from the Stewards or any other authorised representative.

MEASURING TIMES

Horse measuring times will be as follows:

- Thursday 28th August – Thursday 4th September - 7:30am - 11:30am and 2:30pm - 4:30pm
- Friday 5th September – 7:30am – 11:30am

Horses will only be measured within 48 hours of their first competition.

Exhibitors must produce their registration papers at the time of measuring to prove identity of horse. The maximum time given to any one animal in the measuring bay is 10 minutes. Exhibitors are reminded that measuring is an essential part of competition and therefore all rules and regulations apply.

TIMETABLE

A timetable of all classes and events is available on the website - theshow.com.au.

When entering Horses in Action classes, please be aware that due to the complicated nature of programming, there are likely to be clashes between some classes. We are aware of these and every endeavour has been made to eliminate them, where possible. However, due to as many as four rings being run at the same time, it is not possible to eliminate all clashes. Therefore, where these occur, the exhibitor may have to make a choice between one class and the other. The Committee reserves the right to substitute, vary the time of, alter or abandon any event in the day or night programs. The Committee reserves the right to conduct elimination tests in any event at any time, on due notice. Exhibitors entered in other categories must give 24 hours' notice of a potential conflict in the programming. Depending on entry numbers, classes may commence from 8:00 am.

Exhibitors will be required to ensure they are present in the marshalling area 5min before the scheduled class start time. Exhibitors who fail to arrive on time may be prevented from entering the arena to participate in the nominated class.

NUMBERS

In all classes competitors must wear a distinguishing number supplied by the Society corresponding to the number in the program. Numbers must be worn on the chest of the horse in rider classes. Numbers for the full period of the Show will be available from 8:00 am on the Wednesday preceding the opening of the Show and may be collected from the Stabling Coordinator. These numbers shall be retained by the competitor. If a competitor loses a number during the Show, it will be replaced at a cost of \$5.

The number must always be displayed when a horse is out of its stable.

ELIGIBILITY

Each horse, galloway, or pony competing in pair and team classes must be nominated separately on the entry form, and exhibitors may pair with other entries received for the same class. If a pair separately owned gains a prize, the prize will be divided.

A horse, galloway or pony will not be permitted to compete more than once in any one pair class.

A horse, galloway or pony which has won in a pair class is still considered a novice for a single class.

The Committee may restrict riders in jumping classes to riding a maximum of three horses, galloways or ponies. In Hack events, excluding Championships, a competitor will not be permitted to ride more than one horse, galloway or pony in each class.

Substitution of any horse, galloway or pony will not be permitted in any event.

JUDGING

The Society reserves the right to substitute a Judge when deemed necessary.

- Persons other than judges and stewards are not permitted in the ring.
- Horses must not enter the ring unless called by the stewards or a Society representative.
- Winkers will not be permitted except in harness classes.
- Any animal which in the opinion of the stewards is considered dangerous, will be removed from the ring.
- The competing horse's name must not appear on the browband.
- Exhibitors who fail to comply with any direction given by a Society representative may be fined.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Entries eligible for Champion and Reserve Champion awards must be presented to the judge unless exemption has been granted by the Committee.

Entries which are not presented will forfeit the award and prize money in the class in which they gained Championship eligibility. Entries eligible for Champion and Reserve Champion awards must compete under the same criteria under which they became eligible.

Winners of novice classes are not eligible for championship awards.

PROTESTS

Protests against awards must be lodged in writing with the Chief Executive within one hour of the announcement of results.

Protests in all cases must be accompanied by a deposit of \$100 at time of lodging. The deposit will be forfeited to the Society should the protest be deemed frivolous.

OFFENCES

1. Any person who:

- (a) provides the Society with false information relating to their qualifications to compete or the qualifications of their child under 18 years of age to compete;
- (b) provides the Society with false information relating to an exhibit;
- (c) misrepresents the identity of an exhibit;
- (d) does any act or thing which is intended to or is likely to result in an exhibit being incorrectly identified;
- (e) does any act or thing which is intended to or is likely to result in an exhibit being incorrectly measured;
- (f) presents an exhibit for measuring when that exhibit has had any drug administered to it;
- (g) commits an act of cruelty to an exhibit; or
- (h) commits any breach of these regulations shall be guilty of an offence.

2. A Sub-committee of three members of the Society's Horse Committee, which members are neither exhibitors nor competitors in

the Horses-in-Action Section, shall have power to investigate offences and impose penalties including the following:

- (a) disqualification of a competitor from this year's Show and/or future Shows, and forfeiture of any prizes and fees paid;
- (b) disqualification of an exhibit from this year's Show and future Shows and forfeiture of any prizes and fees paid; and
- (c) any combination of the above.

3. Any person guilty of an offence will be reported to the Equestrian Federation of Australia (SA Branch), other Royal Show Societies and the Show Horse Council of Australasia.

4. This part of the Special Regulations shall not derogate from the other parts of the Special Regulations.

TRANSFER OF PENALTIES

This Society reserves the right to refuse entries from exhibitors who are under suspension by another Society.

1. The Society may in its absolute discretion:

- (a) convey to anybody any information concerning any fine, disqualification, withdrawal of a prize or ribbon, handicap, reprimand, warning or any other form of punishment ("penalty") imposed by the Council on or in connection with any exhibitor or exhibit;
- (b) convey to anybody any information concerning any investigation, inquiry or hearing ("proceeding") conducted by the Council, whether or not the proceeding was or has been finalised and notwithstanding that the proceeding did not result in the imposition of any penalty on any person or exhibit;
- (c) recognise, act upon and enforce any penalty imposed upon any exhibitor or exhibit at any time by anybody;
- (d) itself conduct such further proceeding in connection with any matter concerning any exhibitor or exhibit, or any person seeking to become an exhibitor or to enter any exhibit, and impose a penalty in relation thereto notwithstanding that a penalty may have already been imposed by that other body;
- (e) enter in reciprocal arrangements with anybody in relation to any of the matters referred to in (a) to (e) above.

2. For the purpose of (1.) "body" includes any other society, organisation or body within or outside Australia having similar objects to those of the Society and in particular includes:

- (a) RASV Limited;
- (b) The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc.;
- (c) The Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales;
- (d) The Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland;
- (e) The Royal National Capital Agricultural Society;
- (f) The Royal Agricultural Society of Tasmania;
- (g) The Royal National Agricultural and Pastoral Society of Tasmania;
- (h) The Royal Agricultural Society of Western Australia;
- (i) any breed association or society recognised as such by the Society.

VETERINARY SURGEON

Judges and RA&HS officials may call on the Society's Veterinary Surgeon in respect to establishing the soundness of any exhibit.

VETERINARY SERVICE

- 1. The Society will appoint a treating veterinary surgeon to provide a service to exhibitors. The treating vet does not undertake swabbing nor is involved in the selection of horses to be swabbed.
- 2. Should a horse become ill or suffer an injury then the Society's Veterinary Surgeon may attend to and treat such animal in the absence of any authority from the owner, and the Society or its Veterinary Surgeon shall not be liable in any way for loss arising out of such treatment.
- 3. Exhibitors may employ a veterinary surgeon other than the Society's, but in any such instance must inform the Society of the exhibit concerned.
- 4. The Society's Veterinary Surgeon may refuse to attend an animal previously examined and treated by another Veterinary Surgeon.
- 5. Unless otherwise specifically stated, only the Society's Veterinary Surgeon may give certificates required by the Society.
- 6. All costs incurred in the attendance and treatment of an animal shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.

INJURY/DISEASE

If in the opinion of the Society's Veterinary Surgeon a horse on the Showground shall be so injured or be so affected by sickness, disease or other ailment as to warrant its destruction or its removal from the Showground, as the case may be, the Society shall be entitled to have the horse destroyed and/or removed from the Showground and/or shall be entitled to require the owner to forthwith remove the horse from the Showground. Any expense incurred by the Society in respect of such horse shall be debited to the owner.

Animals entered for competition must not have been exposed to any communicable/notifiable disease/s at least 14 days prior to the commencement of the Royal Adelaide Show.

SENSORY HAIRS

In line with the new rulings of both Equestrian Australia and the FEI, the clipping/shaving of sensory hairs on horses competing at the Show is prohibited.

STAINING OR COLOURING

Staining or colouring of hair or skin, or excessive makeup on any Exhibit is not permitted, and any such Exhibit may be disqualified by the Chief Steward, from a Class in which it is exhibited.

SWABBING

The Committee may make or cause to be made, any test of any exhibit on arrival and at any time before, during or after competition including but not limited to, the measuring bay. The Society will appoint a vet for the sole purpose of taking swabs.

EXERCISING/WARMING UP OF HORSES

Helmets must be worn by all riders and junior drivers or passenger (under 18) at all times.

Lunging of horses is prohibited in the exercise ring (east of the Main Arena) between 6:00 am & 6:00 pm unless permission is given by the Horse Committee.

Exhibitors will be required to book a time on the lunging ring via a bookings board provided onsite.

The following times have been allocated for the exercising of horses on the outer half of the track:

Entire (Harness horses track only): 5:30 am till 6:00 am

Hacks, Ponies & Jumpers: 6:00 am till 6:45 am and overnight (track only, walk and trot only)

Harness horses: 6:45 am till 7:30 am (track only)

Exhibitors are reminded that the Adelaide Showground has limited space available for exercising and/or warming up of horses.

Exhibitors who fail to comply with the directions of the Stewards, Marshalls or other officials may incur disqualification.

MARSHALLING

Exhibitors are required to present to the Marshalling area a minimum of 5 minutes prior to the listed start time of their class.

SCHOOLING OVER JUMPS

Schooling of horses over jumps on any part of the Showground other than the area provided is prohibited. Exhibitors or riders disregarding this regulation may incur disqualification.

ADVERTISING

Competitors are not permitted to display any material advertising private sponsors except in jumping competitions in accordance with FEI rules.

RIBBONS

Only ribbons awarded during the current Show will be permitted on exhibits.

EQUIPMENT

Spurs and whips - Spurs which may inflict injury to a horse are not permitted. The Committee and Stewards reserve the right to request the removal of spurs which they consider may cause injury. No whip longer than 750 mm may be used or carried other than in Harness classes.

In Jumping competitions, in accordance with FEI rules.

Boots and Bandages - The use of boots or bandages will not be permitted on horses competing in any event other than Jumping and Obstacle Driving Competition.

Helmets – It is compulsory for anyone riding a horse anywhere on the Showground including practice and schooling arenas to wear protective headgear approved under the current Australian, European or American Standard.

Junior drivers and passengers (under 18) must always wear a helmet.

All riders must wear protective headgear to the current Australian, European or American Standard. No other head gear will be permitted.

The onus is on the riders to comply with the rules regarding helmets, and their insurance may be rendered void in the event of an accident/injury, if they are found to have been using a non-compliant helmet.

It is the recommendation of the RA&HS that inspections of helmets are conducted by competitors/owners on a regular basis to ensure compliance with the rules.

The RA&HS recommends that riders replace their helmets after moderate to severe blows.

DOGS AND BIKES NOT ALLOWED

Dogs, bikes, scooters and skateboards will not be permitted in the Horse area. This regulation will be strictly enforced during the Royal Adelaide Show.

CORRECT ATTIRE

Competitors in Hack or Jumping classes must wear recognised riding costumes.

Riders under 18 years are not permitted to wear high top riding boots in riding classes.

Coaches and handlers are required to be in appropriate attire:

- A collared shirt
- No denim
- No baseball caps
- No Joggers/trainers

Riders taking part in any parade or competition must be correctly attired in accordance with the following conditions:

LADY AND GENTLEMAN RIDERS ON FLAT

Ladies - Formal occasions - Tan, fawn or buff breeches; black high top riding boots; dark type of grey or black coat; stock; vest; gloves; crop or leather covered cane; spurs.

Ladies - Informal occasions - Jodhpurs or breeches; tan or black riding boots; tweed or navy coat; stock or shirt and tie; gloves; crop or leather covered cane; spurs if desired.

Gentlemen - Formal occasions - Breeches; tan or black high top riding boots; tweed coat; shirt and tie or stock; crop or leather covered cane; spurs.

Gentlemen - Informal occasions - Jodhpurs or breeches may be worn.

Gloves optional where not stipulated.

JUMPING CONTESTANTS - as per Article 256 of the FEI Rules for jumping events. Must wear white or light fawn breeches.

HARNESS - Protective headgear (juniors only), gloves, apron, whip and jacket are required.

Earphones and/or other electronic communication devices are strictly prohibited during competition, under penalty of elimination.

FODDER

Exhibitors must arrange their own fodder requirements.

The Fodder Store is located on the Showground at the western end of the Tin Dairy. All sales will be by credit card only.

Any exhibitor who, in the opinion of the Committee, has more fodder than is considered necessary, will be required to remove the excess from the Showground.

Exhibitors must not solicit orders for fodder on the Showground.

CONTAINERS AND HOSES

Exhibitors are requested to supply their own feed and water containers and length of hose with 1" (25 mm) fittings to use at the wash down.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS

The use of primus stoves, heating or lighting appliances of a like character or any naked flame, is strictly prohibited in the horse stalls and lockers.

The alteration of or interference with any electrical wiring, switch or plug is strictly prohibited.

Precautions will be taken to guard against fire and to protect the property at the Showground, but exhibits will not be insured at the cost of the Society.

Smoking is strictly prohibited in all livestock pavilions and lockers.

No exhibitor or other person shall remove or displace or interfere in any way with or use for any purpose other than the prevention of fire, any article or appliance provided for use in the case of an outbreak of fire upon the Showground, nor shall any exhibitor or other person remove or alter or add to or interfere in any way with any fixture, fitting, article, appliance or thing owned by the Society or use such fixture, fitting, article, appliance or thing for any purpose, other than for which it is intended by the Society to be used.

Because of fire risk all stalls will remain unlocked during the Show.

PROPERTY IDENTIFICATION CODE

Property Identification Codes (PIC's) are compulsory for all horse exhibitors. Failure to provide your PIC will result in your entry being refused. For more information or to register, contact BioSecurity SA on 1800 654 688 or visit www.pir.sa.gov.au/pic

CRUELTY TO HORSES

(a) No Exhibitor shall engage or be knowingly involved in cruelty to a horse. The horse committee shall be the sole Judge of what constitutes cruelty, but it may include:

- tongues may not be tied in any manner.
- to whip or beat a horse excessively,
- to subject a horse to any kind of electric shock,
- to use spurs, or to jab the horse in the mouth with the bit, excessively or persistently,
- to remount, or attempt to remount, an exhausted, lame or injured horse,
- to rap a horse,
- to hypersensitise any part of a horse,
- to leave a horse without adequate food, drink or exercise
- excessive exercise, including excessive lunging

(b) Any case of cruelty must be reported immediately to the Chairman of the Committee, accompanied by documentary evidence in support. Reports more than 14 days after the occurrence will not be considered.

GRAND PARADES

In 2025 all horses must be paraded in **ONE** Grand Parade. You get a choice of which parade you would like to enter as per below:

SATURDAY 30TH AUGUST: 3:00PM – PONIES AND CLYDESDALES

SUNDAY 31ST AUGUST: 6:00PM – PONIES/HACKS/SHOWJUMPERS AND HARNESS

WEDNESDAY 3RD SEPTEMBER: 3:00PM – HACKS/SHOWJUMPERS AND HEAVY HARNESS

Exhibitors may lead a mounted horse in the Grand Parade under special circumstances provided approval is obtained from a member of the Horse Committee.

Protective headgear to the current Australian, European or American Standard **MUST** be worn by all riders and harness drivers in the Grand Parade.

Exhibitors must wear their exhibit numbers when participating in Grand Parades.

GRAND PARADE ATTIRE

The standard attire for Grand Parades is the same dress as worn in competitive classes. Inappropriate attire may result in the voucher for admittance to the Grand Parade being rejected.

Handlers must also be appropriately attired

No mobile phones

GRAND PARADE PARTICIPATION VOUCHERS

When collecting numbers from the Horse Office, all exhibitors will need to nominate which Grand Parade they will be entering. You will be provided with a Grand Parade voucher for you to write your details on.

When entering the main arena to participate in a Grand Parade, the voucher is to be handed to a Horse committee member, i.e. one voucher is to be produced each time you participate in a Grand Parade.

GRAND PARADE IMPORTANT INFORMATION

If your horse is on the grounds, it must be nominated for a parade or have an exemption.

If you take your horse home each day but it has had a class on a day that a parade is held it must have nominated to parade in one parade through the show.

If you have multiple exhibits, you need to apply for an exemption for those exhibits not participating. However, one must nominate one mount per parade.

EXEMPTION FROM GRAND PARADES

- An exemption can only be obtained from the Ringmaster.
- Being absent from the Showground is not a valid reason for failing to parade.
- Parade exemptions may be granted to exhibitors who produce a current medical or veterinary certificate.

Once the Society is presented with a medical or veterinary certificate together with an application for exemption to participate in a Grand parade, such exemption, if approved, will cause the ineligibility of the rider and/or horse from all classes of competition for the same day of the exemption or the validity period of the certificate, provided it is no greater than the calendar year of competition.

Exhibitors seeking exemptions for reasons other than the above (eg work commitments etc) may apply for an exemption prior to Friday 11 August and pay the exemption Fee of \$100 per horse unable to parade.

Exhibits will be exempt from a parade on a day that they participate in a class within 1.5 hours of a parade. Exhibitors will be advised during the show of this exemption.

The Committee may restrict riders in jumping classes to riding a maximum of three horses, galloways or ponies. A separate entry form must be used for each exhibit.

First to fifth placegetters receive ribbons (unless otherwise specified).

Exhibitors must list the current season and best performances of horses entered on the entry form. However, the Society at its discretion will determine which entries are to be accepted. Performances will be taken into account.

WALKING THE COURSE

Riders of Group A horses in the class about to be contested only are permitted to walk the course. No other person will be allowed into the arena.

Group B Junior riders are permitted one adult, appropriately dressed (slacks, jacket and tie and brimmed hat, NO denim) and whose name is registered with the Arena Coordinator 1 hour prior, to accompany them during the course walk. This person must leave the course promptly when asked and must not remain on the arena once horses have been admitted to the warm-up. Failure to comply with the afore mentioned terms will cause this privilege to be withdrawn.

Riders are advised that entering and leaving the jumping arena must be by way of the trotting track and/or as instructed by an official. Failure to comply may result in a \$50 fine.

GROUPS A, B and C

The course, obstacles, conditions and judging of each class will be such as the committee shall determine. The course, obstacles and conditions will, however, correspond in the main with those recognised by the FEI. The jumping arena will, when possible, be entirely enclosed, but if not, will be clearly marked with plastic chains or some other easily recognised indicator. At all times the trotting track will be taken as outside the jumping arena. It will be the responsibility of all competitors to acquaint themselves with the extent of the arena and its markings before competing. Points for Most Successful Awards will be calculated on the following basis: First, 5 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; fifth, 1 point.

JUNIOR RIDERS PLEASE NOTE

1. Competitors may take part in competitions for juniors from the beginning of the calendar year, in which they reach the age of 12 years, until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 18 years.

2. From the beginning of the calendar year, in which they reach the age of 16 years, competitors may compete in both senior and junior classes, provided that the same horse does not compete in both senior and junior classes.

ROYAL ADELAIDE SHOW - EXHIBITORS CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

HAZARD REPORTING

Exhibitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Control Centre immediately of any hazards detected. Hazards are any situation which has the potential to cause:

1. Injury, illness or death to people or animals either immediately or in the future
2. Damage or destruction to property

INCIDENT REPORTING

Exhibitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or the Venue Management Office immediately an incident occurs which has resulted in:

1. The injury, illness or death of any person or animal
2. The damage, destruction or loss of property
3. A near miss incident that could have resulted in the consequences listed in 1 and 2

WASTE DISPOSAL

All waste including liquids must be disposed of responsibly and placed in the appropriate bin or receptacle. Storm drains must not be used for the disposal of any waste.

HAZARD MINIMISATION

All areas must be kept in a clean and tidy order with clearly defined and available access and exit routes at all times. Build-up of combustible waste must be avoided.

Care must be taken to minimise trip hazards and obstacles that people may walk into.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The RA&HS are to be advised of all hazardous materials that are brought onto the Showground. Appropriate warning signs and Safety Data Sheets (SDS) will need to be provided before allowing these materials on site. SDS are to be available onsite and provided immediately upon request by an RA&HS Representative.

MEDIA COMMENTS

Any public comment on emergencies, incidents or other venue matters should only come from the RA&HS. The key media spokesperson for the RA&HS is the Marketing Manager.

DUTY OF CARE

It is important to ensure your own safety and that of all other site personnel, visitors and general public at the Adelaide Showground.

All competitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to situations which could lead to injury. This "Duty of Care" extends to the prevention of damage to property.

LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY

1. Release

- Entry to and remaining on the Showground is entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor and to the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor releases the Society (which term includes in this clause the Society's officers, employees, members and agents), from all claims and demands of every kind resulting from any accident, damage or injury occurring at the Showground, and without limitation, the Exhibitor acknowledges:
 - the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibit;
 - the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to or caused by any Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees and Agents;
 - the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury to a Motor Vehicle or any of its contents whilst it is located on the Showground; and
 - without limiting Regulations 1 (a) and 1 (b) above, the Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss, damage or injury resulting from the sale, treatment, failure to treat, destruction, disposal or other dealing with any Exhibit, or for loss, damage or injury to any personal belongings, equipment or property brought onto the Showground.

2. Indemnity

To the maximum extent permitted by law, the Exhibitor must indemnify and keep indemnified the Society and its officers,

employees, members and agents from and against all actions, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses and liabilities including without limitation, consequential loss and loss of profits for which the Society is or may be or become liable in respect of or arising from:

- a) loss, damage or injury to any person in connection with the Exhibit or the relevant Event;
- b) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to any other Exhibit or Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, Agents, or to the property of the Society, or its members, or to the general public, caused or contributed to or by any act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents; and
- c) without limiting Regulation 2(a), loss, damage or injury to the Exhibit, or the Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees, or Agents caused or contributed by an act or omission of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor or by the transportation, feeding or housing of an Exhibit of the Exhibitor.

3. Removal from Showground

Without prejudice to any other provision in these Regulations, where the Society, its officers, employees, members or agents removes an Exhibit, or causes an Exhibit to be removed from the Showground, the Exhibit is removed or caused to be removed entirely at the risk of the Exhibitor. The person or persons removing the Exhibit will be deemed to be the agent of the Exhibitor, and his or her acts and omissions will be deemed to be the acts and omissions of the Exhibitor.

4. Insurance

The Society will arrange Animal Exhibitors Public Liability insurance cover for all Exhibitors of Exhibits being animals. The Exhibitor is bound by the terms and conditions of this insurance and by Statutory Duties as defined under the Insurance Contracts Act (1984). Details of the Animal Exhibitors Public Liability insurance are set out in the Relevant Schedule. The Society does not insure first party loss, damage or injury to Exhibits, and Exhibitors should consider purchasing insurance if required.

5. Personal effects

The Society has no responsibility or liability for any loss or damage caused to personal belongings, equipment or property which is brought onto the Showground by an Exhibitor, his or her family, invitees or Agents.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Emergency information and Emergency Assembly Points for the various animal pavilions and stables will be included with Exhibitor List of Entries and Notice to Exhibitor notifications. Competitors should be familiar with these plans.

FIRST AID

During the Royal Adelaide Show, St John provides First Aid Services but it is suggested that competitors have a basic First Aid kit for minor medical requirements.

St John is not in attendance after public hours.

For emergency contact details, check Notice Boards for onsite assistance or dial 000 for a medical emergency.

RA&HS EMERGENCY FACILITIES

Firefighting and other emergency equipment must not be removed or used for any other purpose. Missing or unserviceable equipment should be reported to the Venue Control Centre immediately.

SMOKING

Smoking is only permitted in designated locations. The Royal Adelaide Show is a smoke free event.

TRAFFIC CONTROL

The RA&HS Traffic Control Policy imposes speed restrictions within the Showground. For the duration of the Royal Adelaide Show the speed limit is 10 kph on the grounds and 8 kph inside buildings.

The use of vehicles inside the Showground is closely managed during the Royal Adelaide Show. Conditions of entry will be provided with the issue of Vehicle Entry Permits.
